Just last November


and December, respectively, the scholarship fund was the recipient of another \$77,494.

The first came from Denver Camp No. 1 here in Denver, Colorado, with a donation of \$72,000 for the Daniel J Collyar and McCabe Family Memorial Scholarship.

The second came from Board Member, Charles R Cloud, adding another \$5,494 to his scholarship fund, bringing the Charles R Cloud Scholarship Fund to a total of \$57,754.

The principle amount of all Scholarship Endowment Funds is held by the Society with the interest earnings providing annual scholarships to college students. Denver Camp No. 1 and Rocky Mountain Camp 999 Merge

Denver Camp No. 1 was the very first chapter chartered in our Society; chartered on June 28, 1890. Since the Society was established in Denver, Camp 1 benefited many times from the attendance and involvement of the Head Camp Officers from the Home Office. As a result, it flourished and grew over the years and was touted one of the largest ten camps in the Society.

On November 17, 1925, at a joint meeting of Denver Camp No. 1 and Columbine Camp No. 7, the two camps voted to consolidate by unanimous

vote under the charter of Denver Camp No. 1. The merger caused Denver Camp No. 1 to reclaim the front rank position in number of members among all camps, with a total membership of 6,862 at that time. Camp (Continued on page 4)

No. 1 retained its rank as one the largest 10 camps in the Society through July of 1971.

Camp 1 has enjoyed a rich history over the last 128 years and has helped many in need, provided multiple scholarships and participated in many volunteer events.

The charter date for Rocky Mountain Camp 999 is unknown; but may be as early as 1962 when the merger of Christian Mutual Benevolent Association (CMBA) occurred. At that time, the Society created a new District and new chapter to accommodate the membership of CMBA. It is also possible that Rocky Mountain Camp 999 got its start in December of 1965 following the merger of Pikes Peak Mutual Benefit Association into the Society.

Regardless of its charter date, Rocky Mountain Camp 999 has enjoyed a rich history of its own, centered around helping others, charitable giving and volunteering in the community.

On November 15, 2018 members of Denver Camp No. 1 and Rocky Mountain Camp 999 met to vote on the consolidation of the two chapters under the historical charter of Denver Camp No. 1. The vote was unanimous!

In this time in our history

where more and more chapters are choosing to disband, this is an example where two chapters came together for the good of the order rather than simply shutting the doors. The new Chapter hopes to increase its member activities and volunteer efforts now that it has a greater number of local members to draw on.

Annual Chapter Reporting Reminder and Hints

Chapter annual reports are coming in nicely. About 30% of our chapters have reported thus far. Remember, this reporting is required for the fraternal department to properly complete the 990-N e-Postcard filing with the Internal Revenue Service on your behalf. So, if you have not done so, please get your reports filed as soon as possible.

We are seeing some common items being overlooked on the reporting thus far.

 If you report that you have social members, please report the number of social members you have. We are seeing this question answered "Yes" only to leave the number of social members blank. Estimate the number if you have to.

 Please include the average number of members that attend business meetings and social events.
We are seeing chapters answer "Yes" to having business meetings and report the number of business meetings but fail to report the average number of members that attend. We use these numbers to calculate the number of total hours for your business meetings and social events. So, please don't leave it blank. We don't need an exact number; estimate it if you have to.

3. Whenever you have to answer the number of hours spent on business meetings, social event or volunteer project, please report a whole number; i.e. 1 or 2 or 3 or whatever; just one number. We are seeing a lot of 1 1/2 Deadline for Chapter Reporting is March 31, 2019!

hours or 1 1/2 to 2. using one number to report your hours makes it easier for us when uploading your information to our database.

Remember, the deadline for Chapter Annual Reporting is March 31, 2019! Once we have received all reporting, the fraternal department will begin filing the IRS 990-N e-Postcard on behalf of all chapters reporting. We are no longer automatically sending each chapter a copy of the 990-N filing. If you would like a copy for your records, please contact Jerry and he will email you a copy.
